
As we move forward in 2021, I am eager and hopeful to see you in person

Annual Book Drive

Scooter's Bottomless Bookshelf at the Loma Linda University Children's Health - Indio provides a free book to each and every child (regardless of age), that visits this health care facility. With Dr. Barbette "Barbie" Beck, AXΩ, as our Chairman of CVAP's annual Books for Children Drive, Scooter's was selected to be this year's recipient of our book donations. These amounted to \$700 in checks and gift cards to purchase books, along with 15 brand new books for early readers.

These were presented to Josh Zahid, Guild's Manager of the LLUCH Foundation on Wednesday, April 14, 2021. Josh Zahid has also provided a press release to the Desert Sun to highlight the generosity of CVAP during the pandemic. CVAP has also pledged to work with the LLUCH Foundation for our 2022 Book Drive as well and we look forward to raising even more funds to support literacy across the Coachella Valley.

Patron Program and Benefit Fund

Our Benefit Treasurer, Jane Auerswald, AΓΔ, and Patron Program Chairwoman, Joan Tegen, KΚΓ, have reported their fundraising and donation results. In lieu of an in-person benefit, our individual "benefit" fundraising efforts brought in a total of \$6,558.48. The Patron Fund donations totaled \$28,928.25. These fundraising efforts led to a total of \$35,486.73 in scholarship funds being awarded to this year's recipients. Our Anonymous Donor Account provides

an additional \$10,000 for this year's scholarships. Our Scholarship Committee has made the decisions as to how this money will be distributed among the scholarship recipients; at each school, the first place scholar will receive \$3,350 and where there is a second place scholar she will receive \$2,350. The Marianne Timmins Memorial Fund will also provide a scholarship of \$3,350.

MEET OUR SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

Under the leadership of our Scholarship Chairwoman, Joyce Johnson, AΦ, a team of our CVAP members comprise the Scholarship Committee who select our scholarship recipients. The Coachella Valley is divided into three areas, East Valley with three high schools, Mid Valley with three high schools and West Valley with four high schools. Linda Simmons, ΔΓ, is the Coordinator for the East Valley high schools which include Desert Mirage, Coachella Valley and Indio. The Coordinator for the Mid Valley schools is Karen Speros, AXΩ. In her area are Shadow Hills, La Quinta and Palm Desert high schools. Linda Stewart, KAΘ, and Martha Blackburn, ZTA, are the Co-Coordinators for the West Valley high schools including Rancho Mirage, Cathedral City, Palm Springs and Desert Hot Springs.

Each of these Coordinators has a team of between six and eight CVAP members who review the students' portfolios provided by the schools, interview the applicants either in-person or via Zoom, and decide on the scholarship recipients together with Joyce and their teams. Who are these members who are charged with this huge responsibility?

In the East Valley with Linda Simmons are Gail Hughes, XΩ, Lisa Corcoran, ΣK, Jane Auerswald, AΓΔ, Ann Dew, AΦ and Giorgi Duvall, KΔ. For the Mid Valley, Karen Spero's team consists of Charlie Consoli, ZTA, Jodie Miller, KAΘ, Amy Jeandron, ΔΓ, Linda Quintal, ZTA, Becky Humpherys, KAΘ, Barbette Beck, AXΩ, and Giorgi Duvall, KΔ. Working with Linda Stewart and Martha Blackburn at the West Valley schools are Mary Warrick, ΔΔΔ, Tootie Killingsworth, KΔ, Linda Cameron, KKF, Sally Alvino, KAΘ, Susan Murphy, KΔ, and Barbara Mueller, AΓΔ.

These are the CVAP members who have made the difficult decisions to select our 2021 scholarship recipients. Thank you to each of them for a job well done. This year's scholarship recipients have been selected following hours of volunteer service and we are sure you're anxious to meet them. She worked for "Kelly Services" for many years and was the national poster girl for the company. In 1986, Marianne married Harry **Timmins** and moved to Carmel. In 1991 they retired and moved to Palm Desert where she was active in many organizations including CVAP, College of the Desert Foundation Auxiliary and a member of the McCallum Theater Support Fundraisers, The Muses. Marianne died in 2003 leaving \$50,000 to CVAP and an unknown sum to College of the Desert. CVAP began awarding its annual Marianne Timmins Scholarship in 2016 to the most

outstanding of the selected scholars. College of the Desert's scholarship is awarded to Art, Psychology and Nursing students with a 2.5 GPA or higher who enrolled in six or more units.

First Place Winner - Charlotte Bija

So I spent a year as a science teacher then five as a guidance counselor. During one parent conference I was recruited into one of the first 3 Physician Assistant Programs in the USA. At last, I thought, my foot is in the door. Truth be told, I was still working in the lab at the local hospital because I couldn't get medicine out of my blood.

My husband said How many degrees do you plan to get? I answered, "As many as it takes ". He replied, "OK, if . . . I can get a sports car. We ended up with 3 different sports cars before I finally became a doctor.

Along the way I had the privilege of studying socialized medicine in England, and training in Africa, Mexico, Brazil and Central America.

I still travel and do medical volunteering. I have been part of the Regional Access Project since 1994. My husband was a pastor so naturally I am active in my churches.


I love to drive cross country on blue roads and see all the nooks and crannies of this country.

SORORITY SCHOLARSHIP now known as SORORITY MEMBERSHIP AWARD

We all know what a CVAP scholarship is. We give these to the selected young ladies graduating from the ten public high schools who also meet our other criteria; for example, they must be planning to attend a four year college or university that has National Panhellenic Conference sororities on campus.

But what was a "Sorority Scholarship?" This was the name of the financial award given to our scholarship recipients who pledge an NPC sorority during their college years. The name "Sorority Scholarship" was often confused with "Scholarship" and so the Bylaws and Standing rules have been amended to eliminate this confusion. What had been called the Sorority Scholarship" is now called the "**Sorority Membership Award**;" this is the financial award given to our scholarship recipients who become a member of an NPC sorority during their college years.

Our scholarships recipients are usually acknowledged at our May Scholarship luncheon (end of the student's senior year) and the money is sent to the recipients during that summer. To qualify for the **Sorority Membership Award**, the applicant must have pledged an NPC sorority and filed a completed application with CVAP by March 1st. Dr. Barbette "Barbie" Beck has served as the Chair of Sorority Scholarship for the last two years and helps our scholarship recipients who pledge an NPC sorority through this process. Next year the role will be filled by Joyce Johnson.

SCCAP -- Southern California Council of Alumnae Panhellenics

On April 28th, SCCAP (Southern California Council of Alumnae Panhellenics) held their spring meeting via ZOOM. Much of the agenda involved reports from southern California universities on their ongoing recruitment efforts. Here is some of the information that was shared by the following schools: Cal State Fullerton, UC Irvine, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Cal State Long Beach, USC and UCLA.

These terms are helpful in navigating recruitment reports and what they were formerly called:

Recruitment (Rush)

Potential New Member (PNM) (Rushee)

Continuous Open Bidding (Informal Rush)

FSL (Fraternity Sorority Life) or SFL (Sorority Fraternity Life) (Panhellenic and Intra-Fraternity Council)

"Total" is the ceiling number for campus sororities as established by the FSL or SFL office

"Quota" is the number of new members that may be pledged during recruitment

All the reporting schools indicated they are continuing with Remote

Recruitment. There were some reports that some of the PNM's felt less pressure with remote rather than live recruitment. Although the numbers in general were slightly down, the efforts on the whole were successful.

USC has instituted Deferred Recruitment (at the beginning of second term as opposed to September). This occurred a few years back in the interests of having a PNM's first term grades before pledging. All of the campuses are installing new positions in the FSL or SFL offices in charge of "Equity and Inclusion."

Each sorority represented at the SCCAP meeting indicated that their national bodies no longer want the legacy program used during recruitment. This is probably true of all 26 NPC groups, although they were not all at the ZOOM meeting to confirm this. Some groups may still use recommendations, (particularly in some regions of the country) but the use of recommendations will be used less and less as equity becomes more of an issue.

There are also (depending on the campus) many more "Greek" groups than the traditional ones in NPC.. There are sororities and fraternities who have never been part of NPC. Additionally, there are now groups specifically for African American students, Latino students, Asian Pacific Islander students, as well as "Identity" groups (sexual preference, etc.) Each of these systems has its own national body, similar to NPC. All fall under the purview of the campus FSL or SFL.
